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Musings from Your Minister:

Report from General Assembly July 2017

I am writing this as I sit in the Louis B. Armstrong airport on my way home to New Jersey after a week of meetings with Unitarian Universalists. The first two days were with over five hundred UU ministers and the other five days was with FOUR THOUSAND (!!!) UUs from all over the continent (and, in fact, all over the world).

There were five of us from TUS present at General Assembly (“GA”), our strongest showing ever (or at least in recent memory). On July 30, you’ll get to hear from the other four who attended – they will be bringing their impressions to you as part of our Sunday service that day. No doubt their enthusiasm will be infectious. I am so thankful for their attendance, their excitement, and how seriously they took their responsibility of being a voting delegate representing this congregation.

This was my third full GA, so I am not “old hat” at it. It still very much feels like a new experience each time I have gone. I find it a combination of exciting and inspirational, overwhelming and, on occasion, disappointing. After a week of overwhelm in 2015, I came away unsure of where in Unitarian Universalism I belonged. This time, I have come away with a deep sense of connection: to my ministry, to my colleagues, to our faith movement, and to you. I come away feeling invigorated and in touch with a renewed sense of creativity.

GA is the one time Unitarian Universalists get to experience worship mega-church style. Worship every day, several times a day. In the early morning, it’s likely “only” 500 or 800 people show up. But in the evening, or on the last day? Well, the whole 4,000. Singing songs, listening to powerful sermons, moving along with amazing music, and resonating with the voices of thousands of other UUs – it’s amazing.

This year we went deep:

- We continued to examine and re-examine how patterns of white supremacy impact who we have been and who we are today, offering up the choice to change it. I am so thankful to the organizers of Black Lives of UU who have raised up this issue – sometimes with jarring language – so that we might not repeat history that brought pain and betrayal.
- We took a new look at the Principles and Sources, considered changes to language that aimed for broader inclusivity. We deferred a change to the First Principle for further conversation. We changed the wording in the Second Source from “women and men” to “people” to reflect a more inclusive understanding of gender identity beyond the binary.
- We are taking seriously, for the first time since it was raised, consideration of an 8th Principle that would explicitly address racial justice.
- We are moving away from able-ist language in the term, “Standing on the Side of Love,” to “Answering the Call of Love,” as we listen to prophetic voices that remind us human bodies come in all shapes, sizes, and abilities.
- After having the first woman president serve as part of the recent three-person co-presidency, we elected the first woman president of our UUA: Rev. Susan Frederick Gray.

This is such a juicy time in our faith movement’s history. So much is possible. So much to gain and so much to lose. So much possibility to repeat problematic history. So much opportunity to co-create new narratives of liberation and hope. I come away not certain of the outcome, but hopeful that we are moving in a good directions.

Teaching Teams for 2017-18 Are Now Forming

The Unitarian Society is taking a break from R.E. classes this summer but new teams for the next RE season are forming now. An introduction to curriculum/input work session will be taking place on Thursday, August 3rd at 7 pm. This may take place virtually or in person (or both). For example, if you can't be there physically, we can give you a link to join us via the Zoom online meeting platform. The RE teaching teams will be comprised of volunteers who have been attending TUS regularly for at least 6 months (by the time classes start in September), preferably longer. Summer Childcare at TUS

Because we are not having formal RE classes this summer at TUS, families and visitors are welcome to utilize our nursery/childcare room which will be staffed all summer. They may also set with their infants and children in the service for its entirety (or a combination of the two.) The only weekend we will not provide coverage is Labor Day weekend - September 3rd.



What Will Your DRE Be Up to this Summer?



The DRE will be continuing to work a Wednesday/Friday/Sunday schedule throughout the summer - present at TUS most weeks (the exceptions are 7/2, 7/16, and 7/30). She will be exploring, researching, and planning curriculum, organizing supply cabinets and the library, and attending important professional development opportunities. She will be at an RE retreat from August 13 through August 16 and will not be at TUS. On Sundays when she is not present, there will be a point person in place for trouble shooting.

Youth Empowerment Program (YEP)

A skill building opportunity for post affirmation youth is taking shape at TUS. We are calling it the Youth Empowerment Program, YEP for short. Youth who have been through affirmation and the training we'll provide later this summer will be given the chance to become part of our paid childcare staff. Separation of Church and State? Yes, it's still there...

Back in early May, the current U.S. president purported to bring back "religious liberty." In broad strokes, he signed an executive order that made moot the Johnson Amendment, basically telling the IRS to use "maximum enforcement discretion" when it comes to implementing the rules against endorsing or opposing political candidates.

This action, along with all the grassroots organizing that has emerged post-election, has meant that liberal religious congregations have had new cause to consider what it means to be political in an ethical way, as well as in a legal way. (Conservative congregations have been bending/breaking the IRS regulations on this for decades, so this is not new territory for them.)

TUS has found itself in confusing situations. Can we rent our space to any of these grassroots organizations advocating on any variety of issues? What about not charge for rent? Of highest import is our values, but after that comes considerations of the law. In particular, the distinction between advocacy (which we are allowed to do) and campaigning (which we are not).

One of the easy ways to think about this distinction is this: does it involve someone running for office? If so, then we cannot do it.

Does it involve someone who is already in office and their platform? Then we can – and should – hold them accountable.

Some examples of no-no's: we cannot have campaign literature for any candidate (unless we have campaign literature for all candidates – then it's considered fair and educational). You may have noticed that in mid-June there was campaign literature in the lobby for All three UUA presidential candidates. We cannot invite one candidate without inviting all the candidates. In fact, on our TUS property, we cannot even ask for signatures for someone running for office (I have had to ask some folks to stop doing this in the sanctuary!)

I raise this issue to you because recently there has been some confusion on this. And because we here in New Jersey are in the midst of an important gubernatorial campaign, so the opportunities necessitating clarity will likely increase. If you have questions or aren't sure, please reach out to me before you make any decisions or invitations.

And just so you know: even though it is now unlikely that the IRS will "ding" us (or any house of worship) for endorsing or opposing, you will not hear from me about who I am voting for. Likely not in a private conversation, and never from the pulpit.

Keep those Food Donations Coming!

We thank everyone for donating food items to the basket in the lobby (behind the reception desk) this year! We have dropped off 20+ boxes of food items and toiletries since September at the East Brunswick Recreation and Community Services building, a distribution point for the Middlesex County Food Organization and Outreach Distribution Services (MCFOODS).

As noted on its website, MCFOODS collects and distributes nonperishable items at no cost to over 80 local food pantries and soup kitchens throughout the County, as well as an additional 25 agencies including: residential facilities, shelters, social service agencies, programs for women and children, senior citizen housing facilities and other outreach services that are also a part of our network.

Some of the most needed nonperishable foods and necessities include rice, tuna fish, peanut butter, vegetables, canned meats, beans, soup and pasta, as well as personal products, baby items and paper goods. (No glass containers, please). The donations are always greatly appreciated!!

Feel free to make food donations to the lobby basket during the summer months. Christina and Jeff Siebens will taking care of getting the food to the Community Center while we are away. (Thank you Jeff and Christina!)

You May Have Wondered: What is the Minister’s Discretionary Fund? When someone within TUS or wider community needs emergency food, lodging or other needs, they often find their way to asking Rev. Karen for help, who relies on the Minister’s Discretionary Fund. It’s used to purchase supermarket gift cards (Scrip) to pay for food or the Minister pays directly for lodging, rent, utilities or some basic survival item. She vouchers her out of pocket expenses for reimbursement. The Minister doesn’t identify the need – it is by her discretion. Every Christmas the Cash in Basket replenishes the fund, but now more is needed. Your donation to the fund (write “MDF” on the check memo line) then reaches those in need in our community. Thank you.

Can you be a TUS Helping Hand?

A small effort can make a big difference when we respond with help and support. The Pastoral Care Team is beginning to use the online service called LotsaHelpingHands.com to organize our efforts to support members and friends of TUS who need us. If you join the TUS Helping Hands team, you will be notified when an online "community" is made for someone who needs some extra attention -- perhaps a dinner delivered to their home, perhaps a ride to a doctor's appointment. 


