




This month is a month that is full. The Futures Task Force is hosting three Listening & Learning Circles to help make sure you are as informed as possible going into the February 12th Congregational Meeting when the Membership will take a straw poll (an informal vote, like a non-binding referendum) on the future direction of the Congregation. If you are a Member, it is really important that you attend at least one of these Listening & Learning Circles – one is in-person and two are online.

January also includes a three-hour meditation workshop, both in-person and online, which I will co-lead with a Buddhist teacher (who is also a dear friend). This is the first mindfulness offering TUS has created: Finding Refuge in Winter. Three workshops, one monthly in January, February, and March, harnessing the power of one of this congregation's strengths and offering it to congregants and the wider community. I hope you will consider attending or making sure your friends know about it. We hope this to not only be a spiritual service to the larger community, but a potential way to raise funds for the Congregation.



Finally, I want to invite you to the online offering on January 28th at 10am – it is an orientation to General Assembly 2023. Since GA is taking place in



Pittsburgh this June, and because Pittsburgh is only a 6-hour drive away, it would be wonderful to have TUS representation this year. If you think you might be interested, or you already know you want to go, please save the date/time in your calendar and keep an eye on the eblast for the zoom link. Attending GA is a powerful way to connect with other UUs and with Unitarian Universalism. It's also not cheap, so unless you have plenty of extra cash in your pockets, it takes planning to make it work. In addition to talking about General Assembly, I'll

give an update on the latest work of the Article II Study Commission, which is revisioning our principles and purposes, deepening them, and changing them in significant ways. Delegates attending GA, whether in-person or online, will vote on the Commission's recommendations. We are also voting for the next president of the UUA. It's a good year to go!

I start the new year by talking about resting, and yet we have a very full first month. So, as soon as I leave after worship that first Sunday of the year, I am off the TUS clock for eight-and-a-half days. I will be on study leave, returning Tuesday, January 10th. My study leave schedule includes reading and planning, but it also includes practicing what I preach.
